\$218,709.25 patronage capital being returned to members

As a member of Grundy County REC (GCREC), you will be receiving YOUR share of \$218,709.25 in December. This represents 100 percent of the remaining unpaid patronage capital for the year 2001 and 73 percent of the year 2017.

Since Grundy County REC is not-for-profit, any money your cooperative receives not needed for operations is allocated back to members. These allocated profits are called patronage capital and are YOUR share of the profits as owners of the cooperative. Your allocation of patronage capital is based on the amount of electricity you use. The more electricity used, the greater YOUR share of patronage capital. With this retirement, Grundy County REC has retired almost \$4.6 million since we began paying patronage back to members in 1961.

In December, a patronage capital credit will be applied to your electric bill if you were a member of GCREC in the years 2001 and 2017. Anyone who is no longer an active member will receive a mailed check. If you are moving off our lines, please notify our office with your new address so you can be sure to receive future patronage capital checks.

Be ready when Mother Nature strikes

When Mother Nature strikes this winter, make sure you're ready. Because winter brings its own set of challenges to staying safe, we remind you to prepare for extreme weather and to stay home during storms and their aftermath whenever possible.

Be ready

Do all you can to prepare. Make sure you have a portable charger and extra batteries on hand. Have a battery-operated radio available (with extra batteries) to listen for updates or instructions.

In preparing for a storm, be sure to:

- Have an ample supply of all medications and a supply of non-perishable food, plenty of drinking water and a first-aid kit.
- Keep a checklist of items to have on hand.
- Prepare your home with proper insulation, caulking and weather stripping. Learn how to keep pipes from freezing.

Stay inside

Stay home during snow and ice storms and wait until roads are passable. Whatever the commitment, it's not worth getting into an accident or finding yourself stranded.

If you do travel and drive into extreme conditions, do not leave your car to look for help. Make sure your car is equipped with several items during colder months: a first-aid kit; blankets, water, snack food; tire chains; booster

cables; emergency flares; and road salt and sand for traction.

When the power goes out, we will restore power as

efficiently and safely as possible. Do not turn on the stove for heat; it is not safe. Instead, use blankets, sleeping bags and warm winter coats. You can also use an up-to-code fireplace or portable heaters when used correctly.

When using a portable generator for power, never use it indoors and make sure it is not close to any windows, doorways or air-intake vents. Do not use it in an attached garage, even with the doors up. Never touch it with wet hands or use in areas with rain, snow, or standing water.

BE PREPARED BEFORE A STORM STRIKES

In the event of a power outage, be prepared by keeping the following items in an easy-to-find emergency supply kit.



■ WATER

Three-day supply, one gallon per person per day.



■ TOOLS

Flashlight, extra batteries, manual can opener, battery-powered or hand-crank radio, NOAA Weather Radio with tone alert.



■ FIRST AID KIT AND PRESCRIPTIONS

First aid supplies, hand sanitizer and at least one week's supply of prescriptions and medications for the family.

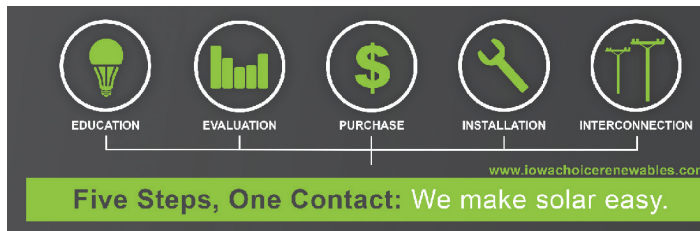

Pole top rescues

At Grundy County REC, safety is our top priority. That's why our linemen undergo pole top rescue training every year. A rescue would be necessary if a co-worker became unconscious while working on a utility pole.

Each lineman must climb a pole and lower a 200-pound mannequin to the ground with a rope in less than four minutes.

Rescue training teaches the importance of planning for a possible emergency. The linemen learn that prompt action by fellow employees is essential in effecting a rescue operation.
